





What's Next?

With strategic investments in and alignment of critical skills development, the region is well-positioned to take advantage of economic growth opportunities



Companies have announced or plan to announce over \$3B in investment in "new energy" projects across South Louisiana

Advanced manufacturing will continue to be a key driver of the regional economy, but with an emphasis on efficiency and new skills

Entergy Louisiana has proposed a two-phased, \$9.6B grid-hardening plan across service area through 2023

Local health systems will continue to have talent shortages in clinical and non-clinical roles

Transportation and logistics (trucking, ports, etc.) is a strategic priority for region, state, and nation

Infrastructure investments will be deployed across the region and state, but workforce challenges will pose barriers
