The students exchanged their silver coins with other classrooms, in order to raise the most money with pennies. The monies donated for the Fun Run will purchase equipment and other needs and/or wants for the students at our school. Meanwhile, the learning continued in our classrooms. In English Language Arts, the students began their new Unit 3 reader, Fables. The unit focuses on the following sounds - /oo/ as in soon, /oo/ as in look, /oi/. /aw/, and /ou/. These sounds will be written in words throughout the text. The newly introduced sounds will appear in dark bold letters throughout the reader to support students with applying the sounds when reading. In Math, our First Graders are working with friendly number 10. With this strategy, students make a ten to add numbers up to 20. Ask your little learner to share more information about this skill during their homework time at home.

Sensational 2nd Graders

Second grade students are having a blast applying all of their newly learned, and previously learned concepts. In Math, students are adding to their knowledge about place value as well as applying adding and subtraction strategies. In English Language Arts, students are listening to stories about "The War of 1812" and learning how to write persuasive pieces. Students are reading "The Job Hunt" in English Language Arts, and in each story, they are applying their code knowledge. Mudbugs are going to explore New York City through their reader, too!

Our Bookfair will be held December 4—December 11.


Please continue reading books and filling out tickets for our Reader of the Month contest. For November and December, we will combine the reader of the month contest.

Nurse News



FIRE PREVENTION FOR KIDS



December is an important month to review fire safety and prevention. It is a common time of the year when heaters, stoves, candles and holiday decorations are running more frequently. Kids are curious about fire. Teaching your children about fire hazards, as well as practicing a fire escape plan with your family, can help prevent accidents and injuries.

Working smoke alarms reduce the chances of dying in a fire by nearly 50 percent. Consider installing a smoke alarm that has a 10-year battery. Test batteries every six months.

Teach kids never to play with matches, lighters or fireworks. Keep candles at least 12 inches away from anything that can burn, and always blow them out when you leave the room or before you go to sleep. Teach older kids not to use candles in their bedrooms, unless supervised by an adult.

Use common sense in the kitchen. Limit distractions when cooking and don't leave a hot oven or stovetop unattended. Move household items, such as wooden spoons and dish towels, away from fire sources. Have a fire extinguisher in the kitchen in case of emergency, and make sure you know how it works. You might be surprised that most people don't know how to use one.

Children should know how to respond to the sound of a smoke alarm. Teach them to get low and get out when they hear it. A child who is coached properly ahead of time will have a better chance to be safe. Practice feeling the door, doorknob and cracks around the door with the back of your hand to see if they are too hot. Help your children practice this step.

Together, have your family plan and practice a home fire escape plan with two ways out of your house in case of a fire. It is important to have an alternate exit in case one is blocked by fire.

If you cannot safely escape your home or apartment, keep smoke out of the room by covering vents and cracks around the door and call 911 or your fire department as quickly as possible. Then signal for help at the window with a light-colored cloth or a flashlight.

To prevent possible fires, avoid plugging several appliance cords into the same electrical socket. If using gasoline-powered devices, store gasoline in a locked location where children cannot access it. Keep only small quantities in an approved container that has child safety features.
