Kindergarten News



In Kindergarten, we are moving towards independence and taking responsibility for our learning. It is an exciting time of showing everything we have learned in the first half of the year. During word study, we have gained an understanding of how sounds create words, and we are using this strategy to read decodable text. Decoding texts and reading for meaning is important for me as a reader. We have begun our study of nonfiction texts. This has given us an opportunity to discuss topics familiar to us and add to that knowledge. We are currently working on identifying main idea and key details. During math we are learning how to put numbers together and take them apart. This leads to the introduction of adding and subtracting numbers. Parents, please remember to complete homework with us every night! It is important to our continued success!

First Grade News



Our first graders have been working really hard since we have come back from the Christmas holidays. With Mardi Gras right around the corner, we will be starting our Social Studies lessons on the history of Mardi Gras. Don't forget to send your beads for the Mardi Gras parade! In math, we have started place value and comparing numbers. Progress reports will be going home on February 8th. Please continue to read with your child every night! In reading we are reading nonfiction books and using text features such as the table of contents and glossary to locate facts and information. We will be using the facts and information gathered to write informative writings. We would like to thank all of the volunteers in advance who have volunteered to help with the Mardi Gras floats for first grade. We are looking forward to seeing all of you at our Mardi Gras parade on February 9th!

Second Grade News

Because we "LOVE" reading, it's a great time to warm your heart reading a good Valentine's Day book with your child. Check out the "Day It Rained Hearts" by Felicia Bond or a nonfiction book "Saint Valentine by Robert Sabuda. In reading, second graders are using reading strategies to help them apply phonics, comprehension, and fluency skills. When readers read fluently, comprehension increases. When your child reads, the reading should sound like natural speech. Encourage them to practice reading carefully, closely, and fluently. Always have them retell what was read in sequential order. Second graders will be reading nonfiction books to locate information and to explain a topic, so have conversations with your child about all the new facts and information they are learning. In writing, students are also focusing on nonfiction as a writer of nonfiction. They will research topics and write informative texts including factual reports.

Second graders must know all basic facts to 20, so remember to continue using flashcards and completing math fact 2-minute drills nightly. Ask your child to try applying one of the math strategies taught when solving basic facts. Learning about the interdependence between people, animals, and the environment will be our focus in social studies. They will look at how this has impacted cultural events, traditions, and celebrations. Working together, we'll have a fabulous February of teaching and learning!

Hand Washing 101

Hand washing is one of the most effective ways to keep from getting the flu, the common cold and many other illnesses. Proper hand washing is the key to help prevent the spread of germs.

Proper hand washing technique

- 1. Turn on warm water
- 2. Use soap and water and rub your hands together for 15 seconds.
- 3. Rinse hands
- 4. Dry hands with paper towels
- 5. Turn water off with paper towel.

Respect: An Important Ingredient for School Success

When students have respect for teachers and classmates, they help create the positive academic environment all children need in order to be successful. To encourage respectful behavior in your child:

Be a role model. Do what you want your child to do. If you want her to say *please* when asking for something, remember to say *please* yourself.

Discuss respect. What is it? Why is it important? How does it feel to be treated with respect or disrespect?

Criticize constructively. When you need to correct your child, do it helpfully and respectfully. "Next time, please hold the door for Grandpa. That will make life easier for him."

Praise success. Notice times when your child is respectful. "You listened to the coach even when other kids were joking around. I was impressed."

Self-control can improve your child's academic achievement

Research shows that self-control is twice as important as intelligence in predicting your child's academic achievement. According to experts, kids who struggle with self-control are more likely to face criminal, financial and other problems later in life.

What can parents do? Focus on promoting self-control skills, such as working hard, behaving well and thinking before acting. Give your child opportunities to:

Take responsibility. Think about what jobs your child can master, such as putting clothes in the hamper at night or setting the table for family meals. To help your child take responsibility for a routine, such as getting ready for school in the morning, post a reminder chart to help her through the steps.

Practice patience. Make and enforce simple rules that encourage self-control. "Finish your homework before watching TV." "Save dessert for after dinner."

The Power of Positive Self-Talk

"It is no secret that thinking can be powerful-especially positive thinking about ourselves and our abilities to solve problems, reach goals, cope with hard times, and accomplish what we set out to do. Positive self-talk creates positive beliefs. Positive beliefs lead to positive attitudes and feelings about oneself and others. Positive attitudes and feelings promote positive behaviors."

"Successful, capable, competent people tend to be self affirmers. They don't get carried away, but they do give themselves frequent pep talks."

Here are some statements that children can use in their positive self-talk:

- "I'm a good person."
- "Everyone makes mistakes."
- "I can do this."
- "I believe in myself."
- "I can get through this."


Additional Information:
