Our 3rd Grade Read 100 Club students definitely agree with this statement! We are so proud of these students for reading 50 or more books during the first two quarters.






Attendance Requirements:

It is hard to believe we are heading into February already! Our character trait for February is "RESPECT". Please talk with your child about being respectful to others and respecting themselves.

We are beginning our new Core Knowledge Reader titled <u>Sir Gus</u>. <u>Sir Gus</u> is a fictional reader detailing the serendipitous, by chance, undertakings of Sir Gus, one of King Alfred's knights. Despite his title "Sir Gus the Fearless," Sir Gus actually has many different fears. In this reader, Sir Gus has to face a thief, a troll, pirates, an evil wizard, and an enemy king. In lessons for this unit, you will notice a decrease in the number of individual words and spellings reviewed in isolation.

This decrease represents a very gradual process in which students will assume **increasing responsibility** and **independence** in reading texts.

We are currently administering addition and subtraction fact fluencies on Fridays. Please be aware that while math fact fluency is not **essential learning** reported on the third nine weeks report card, it is a promotional standard for Q4. We will continue working on Module 4 Addition and Subtraction through 1,000 with and without regrouping. Students should have mastered using chips to add and subtract. We are using the chips and the vertical algorithm. Upon completion of Module 4 we will begin Module 3 which is Shapes and Time with Fractional Concepts.

Our second grade students are more than half way through the year. We ask for your continued support as we work teaching and learning.



Grade Level Spotlight!



February is a sweet month for our fifth grade Eagles. We have been working hard and soon it will be time to have some Mardi Gras fun as we march through the campus in our annual Krewe de Eagles parade. We hope everyone can join us on the route and has a wonderful Mardi Gras!

Our sweetheart scientists will continue diving into Module 3 to better understand Earth's Systems. We will learn how land and water interact and how Earth's systems respond to changes. We have started and will continue to practice test taking strategies for the upcoming LEAP tests.



Our masked mathematicians have been hard at work since returning to school in January. Our krewe has reached Module 4, where we continue to work on fractions and their values as a decimal. LEAP prep is in full effect. We will have an upcoming interim later this month, a LEAP practice assessment that allow students to demonstrate their learning thus far in the year.

Our literacy loving students are enjoying every minute of reading The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe! We are getting close to finishing the book and will be preparing to write from a character's point of view for the Culminating Task.

Our high-stepping historians have been engaged in literacy focused activities and will continue learning about The Medieval World.

Deep breathing is an important coping skill that the counselors and teachers are constantly teaching. It can help kids when they are feeling overwhelmed, angry, or scared. It works by slowing your heartbeat and stabilizing your blood pressure. In class lessons, we practice with pinwheels and have different visuals to help students with the skill. Two are included here. These don't require any tools and can be done anywhere. We encourage them to use these during lockdown/ tornado drills as well as in academic and social situations. February is National Dental Health Month!



Children should see a dentist regularly to stay healthy and avoid dental problems that impact learning. Lifelong habits begin at home. Make dental health part of your daily routine and share these reminders with your whole family:

- Brush your teeth at least twice a day with fluoride toothpaste, especially after breakfast and before bedtime. Drinking water after eating also helps to clear your teeth of food particles.
- Floss every day. An adult should help children under the age of eight to floss. Older children should be ready to floss on their own.
- Limit the number of times you eat snacks, especially the sticky ones and long lasting ones.
- Visit a dentist regularly for a routine checkup and a cleaning
- Protect your teeth by wearing a mouth guard when playing sports.
- Don't forget to change your tooth brush regularly, and after an illness.

Sweet snack facts:

- Eating a lot of snacks with sugar may cause cavities.
- Every time you eat sugar, plaque in your mouth mixes with the sugar to make acid. The acid hurts the teeth and causes decay over time. This can be painful!

How Can You Get Involved and Be An Advocate For Your Child:

Ask questions.

If something concerns you about your child's learning or behavior, ask the teacher or principal about it and seek their advice. Your questions may be like these — What specific problem is my child having with reading? What can I do to help my child with this problem? How can I stop that bully from picking on my son? How can I get my child to do homework? Which reading group is my child in?

Learn about your rights.

It's important to know what your rights are as the parent regarding special services, English instruction, immigration status, and more.

Let the school know your concerns.

Is your child doing well in school? Is he or she having trouble learning, behaving, or studying? Is there a problem with another student, teacher, or administrator?





MANTÉNGASE INFORMADO Y APOYE A SU HIJO

- **Haga preguntas.** Si algo le preocupa acerca del aprendizaje o comportamiento de su hijo, pregúntele a la maestra o al director sobre dicho comportamiento y busque asesoría. Sus preguntas pueden ser como las siguientes: ¿Qué problemas específicos tiene mi hijo con la lectura? ¿Qué puedo hacer para ayudar a mi hijo con este problema? ¿Cómo puedo evitar que otros niños intimiden a mi hijo? ¿Cómo le puedo ayudar a mi hijo a hacer las tareas? y ¿A qué grupo de lectura pertenece mi hijo?
- Aprende sobre sus derechos como. Es importante saber que sus derechos como padre son con respeto a la inmigración, servicios especiales, la instrucción de inglés, y más.
- **Informarle a la escuela lo que le preocupa.** Si su hijo tiene un problema con los estudios, el comportamiento, o con otro estudiante, maestro o administrador.
