Literacy begins at home! It's never too early to begin reading to your child. The time spent reading aloud will create feelings of togetherness and closeness. Here are some helpful hints for reading aloud with your child at home:

- *Make reading aloud part of the daily routine.
- *Be physically close to your child as you read. Cuddle up!
- *Get into the characters of the story. Alter your voice to fit each character.
- *Read and reread the same book. Look for picture clues and details.
- *Have your child make predictions about the book before you begin reading.
- *Ask questions during the story: who, what, where, why, and how.
- *Check to see if your child can retell the story with a beginning, middle, and end.



Grade Level Spotlight!





Is it really March already? Third grade students just wrapped up our second unit titled Because of Winn-Dixie. We explored why it is important to make an effort to really "see" other people. We celebrated our success with this unit by having a party that mimicked the party that the characters had in the book. It was an unforgettable experience. (pictures below)

Now, we are historians! We are traveling back in time to the 1800s and learning all about the acquisition of the Louisiana Territory. Did you know that it doubled the size of the United States? After the LA Territory was purchased, the real fun began. Through our reading, we will meet several explorers who told their stories from their point of view. We will wrap up our unit by expressing our understanding through writing about

who benefitted the most and the least from the purchase of the Louisiana Territory.

Mathematicians will finish up with Module 5, Fractions, by the end of the month. We're sure everyone is learning a lot about fraction models and how to represent fractions on the number line. In the next few topics, students will learn about fractions greater than 1 and also how to generate and locate equivalent fractions in different ways. The first test on fractions will be Monday, March 11th. Also please remember that all basic multiplication and division facts need to be memorized by the end of the school year for success in grade 4.


In Science we will continue Module 3: Traits. We will discover how traits of an individual organism can provide advantages for its survival and reproduction. In the fourth quarter, we will move on to Module 4: Force, Motion, Magnetism, and Static Electricity. Students will have the opportunity to explore various hands-on experiments to test the movement of objects when forces are applied.

March is National Nutrition Month, so we wanted to focus on the importance of attempting to eat as a family. Surveys show that only 30% of families eat dinner together regularly. Studies show kids who partake in family dinners have lower rates of obesity over their lifetime, as well as decreased rates of depression, anxiety, and substance abuse. It also increases resilience and self-esteem. 80% of teenagers in a study shared that dinner was the time when they are most likely to share and talk with their parents. Over the coming weeks, consider trying to incorporate family dinner more often or even making it a family breakfast or lunch on the weekend.

USING AND CHOOSING YOUR BACKPACK PROPERLY

Backpacks are necessary for school, but if not used properly, they can cause muscle and joint strain leading to back pain. The majority of doctors recommend that children carry no more than 10-15% of their body weight in their backpack. If backpacks are not worn correctly

on the shoulders and on both shoulders, the weight of the bag can pull the child backwards. This movement will cause the child to arch the back or bend forward at the hips compressing the spine. This unnatural compression may lead to shoulder, neck, and back pain. Children may also develop poor posture as well.

As recommended by the American Academy of Pediatrics when purchasing a backpack, there are several factor to consider: (1) a lightweight pack [example: canvas is lighter weight than leather] (2) two wide, padded shoulder straps (3) a padded back (4) a waist belt and multiple compartments (to help distribute the weight in the pack evenly)

Other tips to aid in prevention of injury from backpacks: (1) Lighten the load. Encourage kids to bring home only those books necessary for homework and not to fill the bag with unnecessary items. (2) Ensuring that the backpack is picked up correctly can prevent injury. Always bend at the knees and grip the backpack with both hands when lifting it to the shoulders. (3) Make use of all the various compartment in the pack; therefore, all the weight can be distributed as evenly as possible. Heavier items should be placed in the center.




Mrs. Dunn's third grade class practiced typing and did one minute typing tests. Pictured are the certificates with their words per minute as well as accuracy.

How Can You Support Your Child's Learning at Home:

Demonstrate a positive attitude about education to your children.

What we say and do in our daily lives can help them to develop positive attitudes toward school and learning and to build confidence in themselves as learners. Showing our children that we both value education and use it in our daily lives provides them with powerful models and contributes greatly to their success in school.

In addition, by showing interest in their children's education, parents and families can spark enthusiasm in them and lead them to a very important understanding-that learning can be enjoyable as well as rewarding and is well worth the effort required.

Monitor your child's television, video game, and Internet use.

American children on average spend far more time watching TV, playing video games and using the Internet than they do completing homework or other school-related activities.

Encourage your child to read.

Helping your child become a reader is the single most important thing that you can do to help the child to succeed in school-and in life. The importance of reading simply can't be overstated. Reading helps children in all school subjects. More importantly, it is the key to lifelong learning.

Talk with your child.

Talking and listening play major roles in children's school success. It's through hearing parents and family members talk and through responding to that talk that young children begin to pick up the language skills they will need if they are to do well. For example, children who don't hear a lot of talk and who aren't encouraged to talk themselves often have problems learning to read, which can lead to other school problems. In addition, children who haven't learned to listen carefully often have trouble following directions and paying attention in class. It's also important for you to show your child that you're interested in what he has to say.

Encourage vour child to use the library.

Libraries are places of learning and discovery for everyone. Helping your child find out about libraries will set him on the road to being an independent learner. Remember that libraries also offer a quiet place for students to complete homework, and are often open in the evening.

Encourage your child to be responsible and work independently.

Taking responsibility and working independently are important qualities for school success. You can help your child to develop these qualities by establish reasonable rules that you enforce consistently, making it clear to your child that he has to take responsibility for what he does, both at home and at school, showing your child how to break a job down into small steps, and monitor what your child does after school, in the evenings and on weekends. If you can't be there when your child gets home, give her the responsibility of checking in with you by phone to discuss her plans.

Encourage active learning. Children need active learning as well as quiet learning such as reading and doing homework. Active learning involves asking and answering questions, solving problems and exploring interests. Active learning also can take place when your child plays sports, spends time with friends, acts in a school play, plays a musical instrument or visits museums and bookstores. To promote active learning, listen to your child's ideas and respond to them. Let him jump in with questions and opinions when you read books together. When you encourage this type of give-and-take at home, your child's participation and interest in school is likely to increase.

Fomente el aprendizaje de su hijo en la casa

- *Demuestre una actitud positiva con respeto a la educación. Lo que decimos y hacemos en nuestras vidas diarias les puede ayudar a desarrollar actitudes positivas hacia la escuela y el aprendizaje, y a desarrollar la confianza en sí mismos como estudiantes. Al demostrarles que valoramos la educación y utilizamos nuestro conocimiento en la vida cotidiana, les damos un ejemplo muy poderoso a seguir, lo cual contribuye mucho a su éxito en la escuela.
- *Aliente a su niño a leer. Lo más importante que usted puede hacer para ayudarle a su niño a tener éxito en la escuela-y en la vida-es ayudarle a leer. No podemos enfatizar demasiado la importancia de la lectura. La lectura ayuda a los niños a superarse en todas sus materias. Más aún, es la clave para el aprendizaje de toda la vida.
- *Hable con su niño. Hablar y escuchar cuidadosamente son dos destrezas que juegan un papel muy importante en el éxito escolar de su niño. Los niños pequeños aprenden las destrezas del lenguaje que necesitarán para tener éxito aprendiendo a leer a través de lo que escuchan a sus padres decir, las charlas entre los miembros de su familia y cómo son alentados a responder. Por ejemplo, los niños que no escuchan mucha conversación o a quienes no se les alienta a hablar y participar, suelen tener problemas al aprender a leer, lo cual puede causar retrasos en su desarrollo escolar. Además, los niños que no han aprendido a escuchar con cuidado frecuentemente tienen problemas siguiendo instrucciones o prestando atención en clase. También es muy importante que usted le demuestre que le interesa lo que el niño dice y piensa.
- *Anímalo a usar la biblioteca. Las bibliotecas son lugares de aprendizaje y descubrimiento para todos. Al ayudar a su niño a descubrir la biblioteca usted lo iniciará en un camino seguro hacia el aprendizaje independiente. Las bibliotecas también tienen un gran número de recursos para estudiantes de todas las edades, como material de referencia, computadoras y muchos tipos de libros, ¡sin mencionar que ofrecen un lugar tranquilo para estudiar y hacer la tarea! Servicios de la biblioteca para niños de edad escolar describe los servicios que las bibliotecas ofrecen a los estudiantes.
- *Aliente a su niño a ser responsable y trabajar independientemente. Tomar mayor responsabilidad y trabajar independientemente son cualidades importantes para el éxito escolar. Fomenta la responsabilidad, la independencia, y el aprendizaje activo ofrece algunas sugerencias para ayudar a su niño a desarrollar estas cualidades.
- *Fomente el aprendizaje activo. Los niños necesitan participar en actividades de aprendizaje activo al igual que en actividades de aprendizaje independiente como leer o hacer tarea. El aprendizaje activo incluye hacer y responder a preguntas, resolver problemas y explorar intereses. El aprendizaje activo también se realiza cuando su niño participa en actividades deportivas, juega con sus amigos, actúa en una obra de teatro de la escuela, toca un instrumento musical o visita museos y librerías. Para promover el aprendizaje activo, pida que su niño comparta sus ideas con usted y respóndele.

Fifth grade students have been working hard on Digital Citizenship Lessons.

We have completed: Media Balance and Well-Being-We discussed what makes different media choices healthy and how to make responsible choices. Privacy and Security-We discussed clickbait and how to avoid it and how the internet is full of catchy headlines and outrageous images, all to make us curious and get our attention. Digital Footprint & Identity- We discussed our online tracks and how our online activity affects the digital footprints of ourselves and others. We also discussed Relationships and Communication, and Cyberbullying. In upcoming weeks we will read and discuss The Gossip Monster, and News Media & Literacy.



Fourth Grade students have been working on the Project Lead The Way module, Input/Output: Computer Systems. In this module, students are becoming computer scientists as they explore computing systems. Students learned about computing systems and how the systems process input to produce output. Students are in the process of creating programs using a block-based coding language in Scratch. They will apply the skills and knowledge learned from

the activities and projects to design and program a digital game that keeps children busy while they are waiting.

Suggestions for ways that you can build upon the concepts in this module include: Ask your child to explain the Engineering Design Process.

Ask them to share their Activity-Notebook Input Output Computer Systems located in their Google Classroom for Technology.
