Destrehan High School AP English Summer 2023-24 Reading List (non-Gifted Classes)

Research indicates that the single most effective way to improve reading, writing, and vocabulary is through reading practice. Moreover, colleges and universities expect entering freshmen to have had a broad reading experience in high school. Therefore, the Honors/AP Program in English provides an opportunity for students to be challenged by reading the following works.

Students in AP English III and IV will be tested on summer reading on the first day of class. The test will cover characters, settings, and events, and will also test students' understanding of literary and thematic elements as they relate to the books. Students who do not demonstrate proficiency in the material will be given a supplementary assignment.

Please note that students in Gifted sections of AP English III and IV will have separate assignments; the ones listed below do not apply to those classes.

Reading for AP English III (the title will be tested in the first quarter)

In Cold Blood by Truman Capote

Your assignment is simply to read the book, and understand it as best you can. Why did he write this? What is his purpose? You are encouraged to do additional research and reading about the book. There is no summer writing assignment; students will be tested during the first week of class on their understanding of the book.

Reading for AP English IV (titles will be tested in the first quarter)

The Turn of the Screw by Henry James Hamlet by William Shakespeare The Joy Luck Club by Amy Tan The Picture of Dorian Gray by Oscar Wilde

As students read, they should be aware of the following, and are encouraged to do additional reading/research:

Characters: Identify and (briefly) describe major characters.

Settings: Identify the locations in the book, and their importance.

Conflicts: What are the protagonists' goals, and what difficulties do they face in resolving

them? Conflicts may be internal (person vs. self) or external (vs. person or nature).

Events: What major events occur in the book? What is their significance?

Literary devices: Consider uses of narrative (point of view, the work's structure) or figurative language (symbols, comparisons). Identify them and their significance.

Theme: What message or insight is the author trying to share? This is not just the subject of the story, and it is more complex than a moral or cliche'.

There is no summer writing assignment; students will be tested during the first two weeks of class on their understanding of the works.

The following list is a catalog of titles that have frequently appeared on the AP English: Literature & Composition exam. AP English IV students are encouraged to read works from this list to increase their breadth of literary experience.
